HOW THE FUND WORKS — THREE PILLARS

Landscape development

Strengthening governance, supply chains and multi-stakeholder platforms.

Investment readiness

Grants that prepare climate-resilient SMEs to raise capital.

Concessional loans

Low-interest, flexible loans to SMEs working with smallholders.

Impact in context

Only a fraction of global climate finance reaches adaptation, and almost none comes from the private sector. That is the gap the LRF works to close — financing SMEs and landscape partners that help smallholders adapt, then recycling repaid loans into new projects. In 2025 the fund worked on its three active landscapes — including a new program in the Brazilian Amazon — and concluded a five-year investment-readiness program funded by the Global Environmental Facility (GEF). INVESTMENT READINESS

Small grants, big impact

Between 2021 and 2025, the LRF — under a GEF project — deployed technical-assistance grants to nine climate-resilient SMEs across seven countries. The result: USD 5.8 million in private capital mobilised, more than 3,000 farmers trained, and a 1:9 leverage ratio. An independent evaluation found that structured pre-investment support is among the most catalytic tools in adaptation finance.

VIETNAM · CENTRAL ANNAMITES

A seed worth protecting

In November 2025, a collaboration between WWF-Vietnam, the Sepon Group and local government opened Quảng Trị's first formal tung-seed export channel, with a landmark contract and a first shipment to India. The new market lifted prices and benefited more than 1,000 households.

BRAZIL · TAPAJÓS

Sweet success in the Amazon

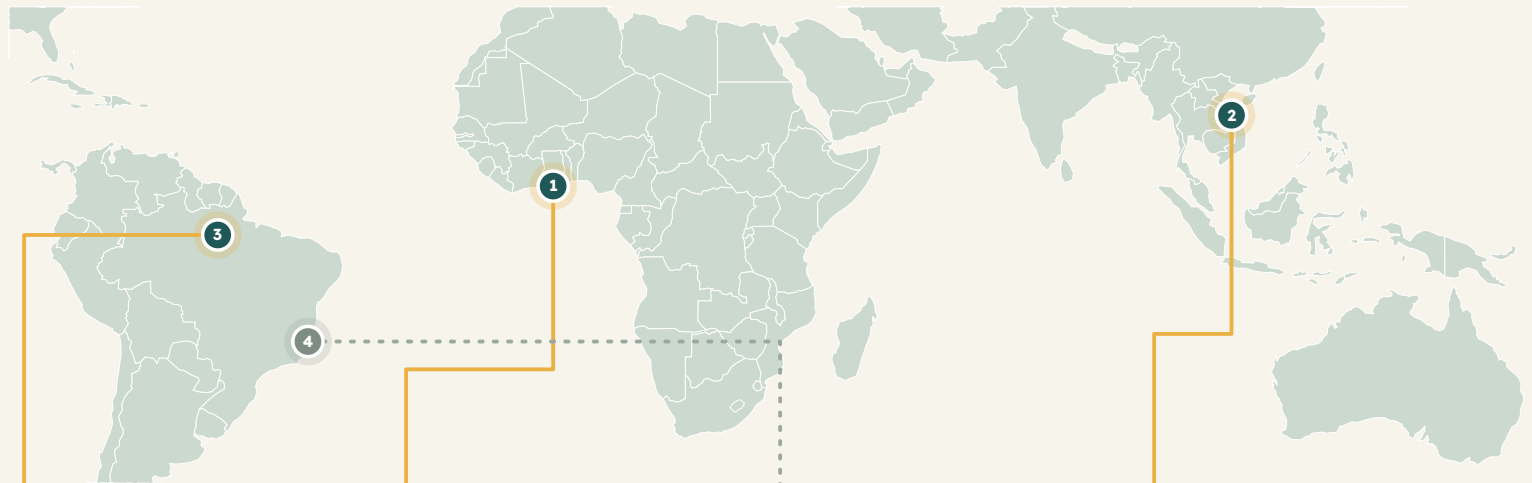
Through the community-led Ecocentro hub on the Tapajós river, stingless-bee honey is helping families build thriving livelihoods while keeping the forest standing. LRF co-funding for processing equipment and a new business plan is connecting roughly 50 families to better markets.

GHANA · KAKUM

New value from cocoa

Koa turns cocoa pulp — once left to waste — into juice, concentrate and powder. In 2025 it launched the world's first cocoa-fruit juice shots in Europe. To date Koa has purchased from 4,757 farmers and paid out over USD 1 million for a crop that previously had no cash value.

WHAT THEY DO

Community-led governance and climate-smart cocoa agroforestry. A 20-year landscape vision was finalised, integrating Koa's cocoa-pulp value chain and Talmond's tropical-almond trees.

2 Central Annamites Quảng Trị & Huế, Vietnam

ACTIVE

WHO WORKS THERE

WWF Vietnam (lead), Slow Coffee (landscape partner), and NTFP enterprises such as Pun Coffee, Nhien Thao and Bao La.

WHAT THEY DO

Agroforestry and non-timber forest-product value chains. The multi-stakeholder platform was institutionalised in Quảng Trị; first tung-seed exports reached India.

3 Pará / Tapajós Brazilian Amazon

ACTIVE

WHO WORKS THERE

WWF Brazil (lead), Nossa Fruits (landscape partner), Ecocentro, 100% Amazônia and the OSocioBio platform.

WHAT THEY DO

Açaí and forest-product supply chains that keep forests standing — processing hubs, organic certification, stingless-bee honey and policy advocacy.

4 Espírito Santo Atlantic Forest, Brazil

LEGACY IMPACT

WHO WORKS THERE

Earlier LRF landscape — coffee and agroforestry with smallholders in the Atlantic Forest.

WHAT THEY DO

No longer an active program, but its lessons continue to shape LRF's landscape approach and the gains made on the ground endure.

Repaid loans are recycled into new projects, and every landscape we support is a step toward our goal: a self-sustaining way to finance climate adaptation where it is needed most.
